## From our Pastor

### **A Sacred Remembrance: Honoring Sacrifice, Then and Now**

Each year, as we move through the month of May, we carry with us the solemn and sacred echo of Memorial Day, a time set aside not just for reflection, but for deep gratitude. It is a holy pause in our national rhythm, calling us to remember the brave men and women of the armed forces who gave their lives so that others might live in freedom. Their sacrifice is not abstract. It is personal. It is costly. It is final.

They were sons and daughters, mothers and fathers, friends and neighbors. They laughed, they dreamed, they loved, and then, in a moment defined by courage, they answered a call greater than themselves. For the sake of liberty, for the protection of others, for the promise of a nation, they laid down their lives.

And we must also remember that behind every fallen soldier stands a family who carries a different kind of sacrifice. Spouses who endured long nights and uncertain days. Children who grew up with empty chairs at the table. Parents whose hearts bear a weight that words cannot fully express. These families did not wear the uniform, but they carried the burden. Their strength, their faith, and their endurance are also worthy of our deepest honor.

Memorial Day invites us to give thanks, not casually, but reverently. It reminds us that freedom is never free. It has been paid for, again and again, with the lives of those willing to stand in the gap for humanity. Yet as we honor those who gave their lives in service to our country, we are also called as people of faith, to widen our lens of remembrance.

We live in a time marked by profound challenges. In recent years, we have witnessed the devastating impact of a global pandemic. We have seen communities shaken by hurricanes, torn apart by tornadoes, consumed by wildfires, and disrupted by disasters that

have claimed countless lives. We have watched families grieve unexpected losses, and individuals carry burdens that seem too heavy to bear.

Though their deaths may not have come on a battlefield, they were no less significant. They were lives filled with purpose, with relationships, with meaning. They were people deeply loved and now deeply missed. Their stories deserve to be remembered. Their names deserve to be spoken. Their lives deserve to be honored.

In this season of remembrance, we are invited into a broader understanding of sacrifice and loss. We recognize not only those who died for freedom, but also those who lived courageously through hardship, who endured suffering, and who, in many cases, gave more than they ever expected to give. As the church, we hold space for both gratitude and grief.

Scripture reminds us in John 15:13, *“Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one’s life for one’s friends.”* On Memorial Day and in this season beyond it, we see reflections of that love all around us. In acts of service. In quiet endurance. In lives given, and in lives remembered.

Immanuel, may we never take that love for granted. May we live in a way that honors every sacrifice by loving one another more deeply, by serving more faithfully, and by carrying forward the hope that even in loss, God’s grace still holds us. Let us remember. Let us give thanks. And let us live worthy of the legacy we have received.

## Minutes of the Church Council Meeting

April 14, 2026

Present: John Bogdajewicz, Timothy Guethler, Kim Haynes, Karl Klasing, Don Morice, Nancy Remmert, Melinda Schuster, Judy Sherman, Martha Snead, Pastor Deon McKenzie.

The Council gathered at 6:00 p.m. Jonathan Dever, our investment advisor from Edward Jones, reviewed the investment reports.

At 7:25 p.m. the Council meeting was called to order by President Judy Sherman. Martha Snead shared a devotion. The minutes of the March Council meeting were reviewed with minor corrections. It was moved and seconded (Don Morice/John Bogdajewicz) that the corrected minutes be accepted. Motion carried.

Tim Guethler and Karl Klasing presented the Financial Reports. It was moved and seconded (Don Morice and Tim Guethler) that the Financial Reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

### PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor reported that he is encouraged by the spirit moving in the congregation. He was particularly blessed by the two Baptisms which were recently held. He has a strong feeling that God is preparing us for a blessed future. He had reviewed some Immanuel history and was astounded by the report of attendance on Easter Sunday in the 1960's, which was over 1,000 in five worship services held that day. While our numbers are fewer at this time, his feeling is that we are moving in the right direction to insure our future. The enthusiasm surrounding the Food Pantry and the other activities that are part of our community outreach express our support of the north county area and our ap-

preciation for being here.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS

#### Policy and Personnel: Charlie Miller

Judy Sherman reported that she had spoken to Charlie and there was no report at this time.

#### Property and Grounds: John Bogdajewicz

John gave a review of the items that are on a list to be completed. Reported on the projects that have been completed and reminded us of the challenge we face maintaining three buildings that are getting older. He reported that he had received a bid to upgrade the ceiling in the Education Building Kitchen. The bid is \$2400 and will meet health department guidelines. It was moved and seconded (Karl Klasing/Tim Guethler) that the bid be accepted and the work completed as soon as possible. Motion carried.

#### Board of Christian Education (BCE): Martha Snead

Seven to 8 youth participated in the March activities which included a lesson session and preparing a skit for Easter morning during worship. They gathered to prepare 100 sandwiches for All Among Us to be distributed to homeless people in the area. They donated extra Easter Eggs to the Food Pantry. The Committee discussed plans for Vacation Bible School (VBS). It was decided that this summer the current format will be followed and that plans for reimagining what we can do in the future to better serve the community and the volunteers. Two youth have registered for Camp MoVal.

#### Worship Committee: Martha Snead

The Committee planned the details for the Seder Meal on Maundy Thursday. (Which was well-done and well attended.) More ushers are needed for Sunday mornings, so outdoor and indoor ushers (greeters) could be reinstated. The Choir has been re-

hearing regularly and singing at worship more frequently. Pastor requested suggestions to enhance the Baptism experience for the families. It was mentioned that we start providing a sponsor from the congregation to help welcome and orient newcomers to Immanuel, and reinstate the custom of giving new members a loaf of bread. Walter Martinez made a presentation about "Centering Prayer" to deepen our relationship with God. He will present to the Council his plan to form a group meeting at Immanuel.

### Christians in Action (CIA): Nancy Remmert

The group has not met recently. However, they are planning on repeating some of the activities they have sponsored in the past. The next event will be to organize a Grafton Boat Ride.

### Mission Outreach: Melinda Schuster

The Blessing Box is now filled every day instead of three times a week. The 100 meat and cheese sandwiches that were prepared by the Youth and adult advisors were packaged with chips, mayo and mustard packets, cookies, fresh fruit, wet wipes, napkins, lunch bags and bottled water. All Among Us distributed them to the unhoused individuals in the area. Mission Outreach will provide a Mexican Fiesta for Room at the Inn on Thursday, April 30. Lydia's House will be provided a meal of Pasta & Meatballs plus salad, dinner rolls, fruit, desserts and drinks on Wednesday, May 6, 2026.

Bridging Ministries have decided to support this year two organizations that serve women and children. JADASA provides sanctuary and services for victims of rape and abuse and the Child Advocacy Center serving children suffering from abuse. Funds raised from their activities will be divided between these two organizations. The first activity will be a Baby Shower at Zion Lutheran Church in Ferguson on May 16. Collection of baby items

(diapers, wipes, etc.) will begin May 9. On June 13, a Rummage Sale will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Christ the King UCC Church. Volunteers with muscles are needed to help us close at 1 p.m. to move tables back into the church, box up left overs and take them to the thrift stores. Details about when and where to put your donations will be announced soon. On August 15 an Ice Cream & Bingo Social will be held at Church of the Master, time, to be announced. Attention Pet Owners: On October 3 we will have a joint worship service and pet blessing. Time and place to be announced. On December 13, at 2 p.m. we will hold the third annual Christmas and Krystal Bells Concert at Immanuel UCC. Bridging Ministries is represented by 10 congregations where opportunities to work together to provide ministry and fellowship. Their representatives meet the Fourth Monday of each month at 10 a.m. at Church of the Master UCC to make plans and pray for each other.

Things seem to working well. Thomas Hemingway is doing a good job.

### Budget and Finance: Karl Klasing

An Audit is planned in July.

Pastor Report: Pastor was unable to be here. Jennifer gave a brief report that the new furniture has arrived and the old furniture needs to be removed. Also, the irrigation system is being installed after which sod will be put down.

Church Council Report: Martha reported that an investment advisor will attend the next Council meeting. All are welcome to attend. Saturday, April 11 is the day of retreat for council members. She report-

ed that April 21 is the final meeting on the updating of the church by-laws. Council has approved updating the Ladies' Room in the Reception Room.

Youth Coordinator Report: Youth attendance : March 22 – 8 youth, April 5 (Easter) – 8. Sarah E. reported that the Easter Egg Hunt was very successful. On April 12 the youth will make sandwiches for All Among Us staff to hand out to the unhoused. An ongoing project for the youth is a project to paint a stained glass design on the Youth Room and Harvest of Hope Food Pantry windows.

Kimberly and Sarah E. reviewed information about the structure, dates, etc. for this year's VBS. They are excited about the materials, Illumination Station, which involves interactive learning. Pastor has contacted the Ferguson Partnership churches to see what the interest in VBS going forward is. Sarah E. and Peggy will go to area churches to invite their participation and hand out flyers. Sarah E. is putting together decoration ideas and has planned a Glow in the Dark party on the Friday of VBS.

Old Business: Confirmation letter will be sent soon.

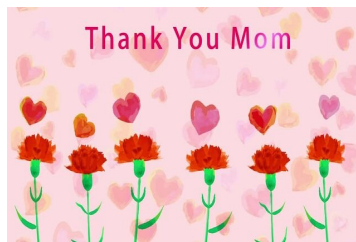

**Student Volunteers:** Assist facilitators, storytellers/teachers.

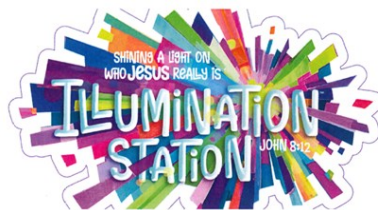
